Chardon Flower: Traditionally a symbol of resilience and hidden strength, the chardon flower deepens the connection between the Magician and Montparnasse; both are delicate yet dangerous, shrouded in charm but edged with thorns.

Last December, I had the privilege of seeing the Théâtre du Châtelet's Les Misérables—a breathtaking production that honored the original novel with thoughtful direction, intricate design, and unforgettable performances.

Each character felt vividly alive, like threads in a richly woven tapestry. With their own textures, colors, and placement, they came together to form a Paris that was both raw and radiant—a living world where poverty and wealth, freedom and constraint, beauty and decay coexisted in dynamic tension.
